WORKSHOPS

Mindfulness Based Cognitive Therapy for Life (MBCT-L)

This module explores issues and methods involved in conducting qualitative and/or ethnographic research in the social sciences related to the digital.

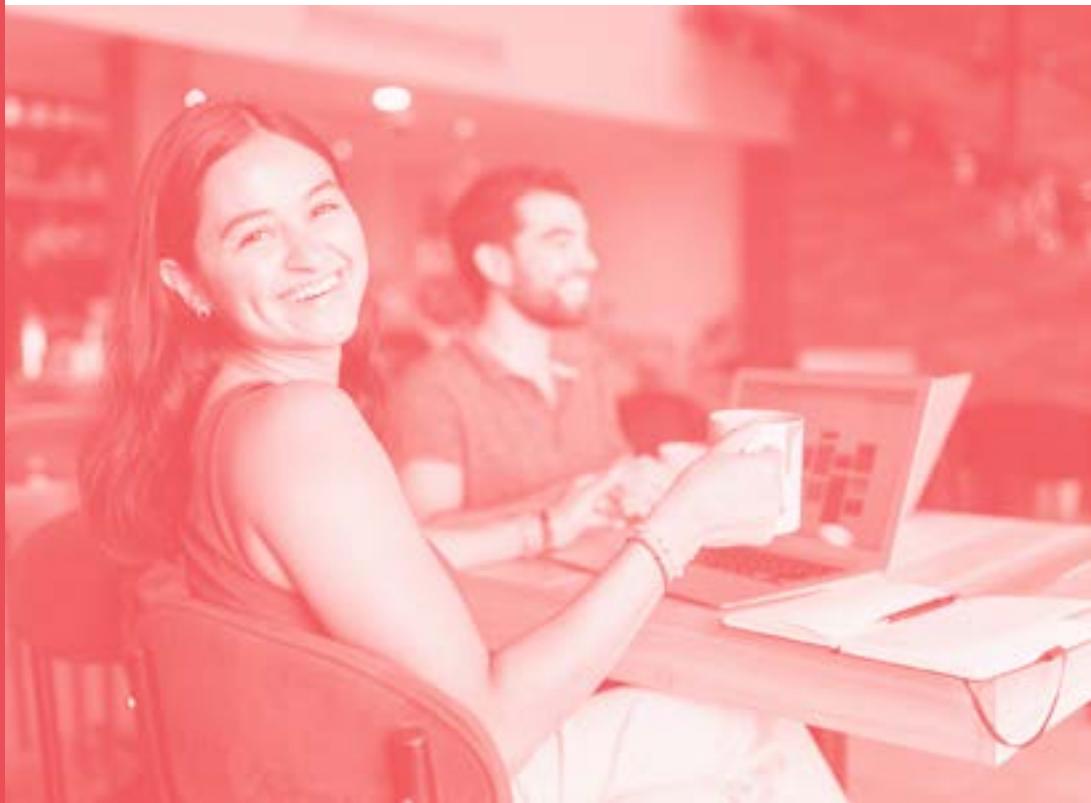


How to Write about your Research for Publication

Vicarious [Secondary] Trauma Workshop

The Vicarious Trauma Workshop is designed for researchers whose work engages them with the traumatic experiences of others. It aims to help researchers reduce the risk of vicarious traumatisation and manage the exceptional emotional demands this kind of research can place on them.



Writing & Editing Books and Book Chapters

This workshop provides DPhil students, early-career researchers and post-docs an introduction to the basics of writing and editing academic books and book chapters. The course takes a publisher's perspective throughout, and introduces participants to the huge changes that are radically changing academic publishing worldwide. A focus will be on using DPhil and Postdoc research as a means of generating viable book publications.





DPhil Writing Workshop

Use Reverse Outlining

Reverse outlining is a powerful tool for ensuring your writing is well-structured and comprehensive. This session will guide you through the process of creating an outline from your completed draft, allowing you to see the overall structure and identify any gaps or redundancies.



Making Data Work: Practical Strategies for Managing Research Data

Maintaining well-organised data is essential for researchers to keep accurate records of fieldwork data and make informed decisions.

You will have the chance to engage directly with our expert panellists, connect with fellow researchers, and learn from each other's experiences and strategies for navigating the complexities of research data management.



Overseas Fieldwork Safety

4 June, 09:30 – 13:00

This course provides an essential overview of the approval process and equips you with the tools to plan and document safe fieldwork through appropriate risk assessments. Aimed at researchers conducting qualitative and ethnographic studies, particularly in areas where the FCDO advises against travel, this session offers valuable group activities and opportunities to learn from fellow researchers' experiences.



Teaching with Museum Objects: Eloquent Things

10, 11, 12 & 13 June, 10:00 – 13:00

In an increasingly virtual world, direct encounters with real objects have come to be regarded as important and versatile tools in University teaching across a wide range of disciplines. The Ashmolean has established itself as a pioneer of this exciting new pedagogy.

Eloquent Things is a short course, comprising four mornings in the study rooms and galleries of the Ashmolean Museum, intended as a hands-on introduction to the principles and practice of teaching with objects.

The course is led by Dr Jim Harris, the Ashmolean's Teaching Curator.



Advanced R for Social Science Researchers

This one-day course provides Social Scientists with a range of useful tools and techniques to improve their ability to code using R. This workshop is aimed at students who have already got the basics of R (Loading in data, cleaning data, running regression models and producing ggplots).

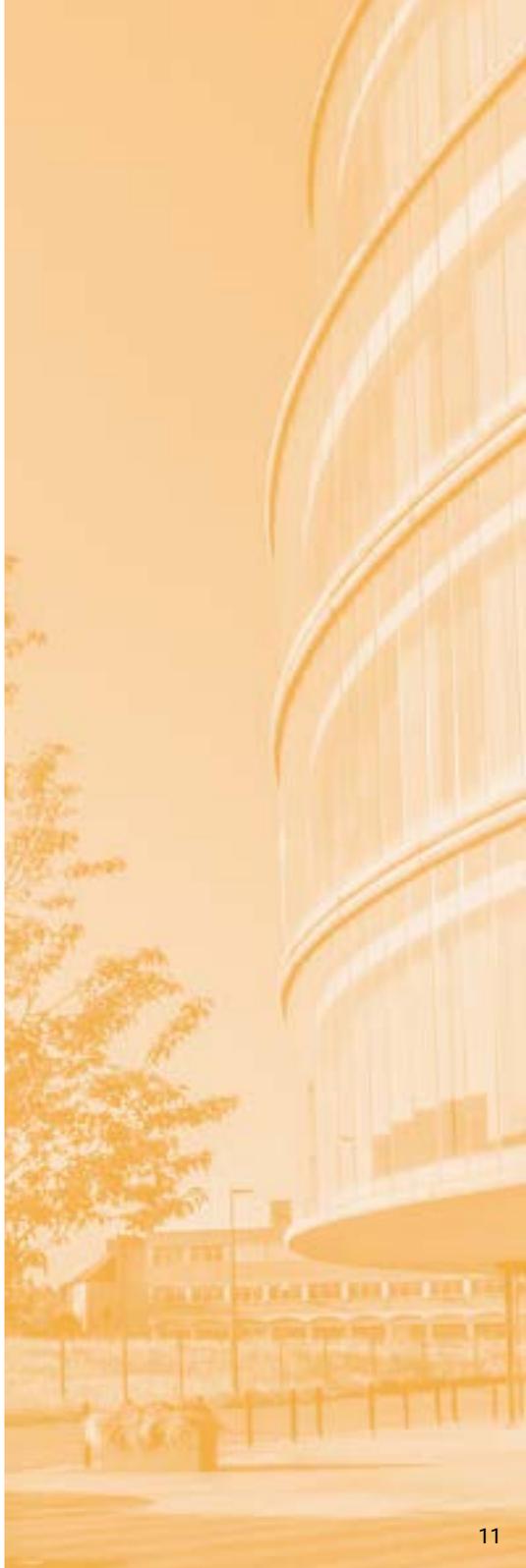


Interdisciplinary Research: Overcoming Barriers and Unlocking Potential

Refine your Writing

This session focuses on techniques to improve the quality of your academic writing. You'll learn how to enhance clarity, precision, and conciseness in your writing, making your arguments more compelling and easier to understand. The session will cover common pitfalls in academic writing, such as verbosity and ambiguity, and provide strategies for avoiding them. By the end of the session, you'll have a toolkit of techniques to sharpen your writing, making it more effective and impactful.



Insider and Outsider Fieldworkers

For some of us, our research projects are situated back home or in locations where we have already spent considerable time. For the rest of us, our field sites could be in locations where we are visiting or living for the first time. Some of us work closely with people in our own communities, whilst others join local communities as external fieldworkers. Depending on our backgrounds, we may navigate fieldwork as “insider” researchers, “outsider” researchers, or both.

Under this theme we provide flexible, informal spaces for collaboration, problem-solving, and growth. And our online Co-Working Sessions, held Mondays and Fridays during term time, create a virtual environment for shared productivity and mutual support. Whether you're seeking advice, accountability, or simply a change of pace, ResearcherConnect is your go-to resource for building connections and enhancing your research experience in a less structured, more organic way.
